# Is your home LEAD safe?

Are there items in your home that contain lead? Use the checklist below to find out.



#### 🗌 1. Makeup

Imported beauty products from Asia, India and Africa may contain lead, including, Sindoor, Khol, Kajal and Surma.

### 2. Glazed Pottery

Items from other countries may contain lead, even if bought within the United States.

### 🗌 3. Soil

Soil or dirt could be contaminated from lead-based paint or by living near an industrial factory, highway or mine.

## 🔅 5. Home Remedies

Home remedies or Ayurvedic remedies (Azarcon, Greta, Pay-loo-ah)

### 4. Toys & Jewelry

Older toys or toys purchased in discount stores can contain lead, as well as costume or play jewelry.

### 🔅 6. Spices & Candy

Imported candies (tamarindo, chili) or imported spices (turmeric)

#### 7. Lead Crystal, pewter or porcelain
